Students swapped the classroom for the board room as part of **National Enterprise Week.**

This is an annual UK-wide week of activities and events, aimed at inspiring young people to have ideas, make them happen and encourage an enterprising culture. Skills were developed such as problem solving, risk taking, resourcefulness, taking the initiative and selling their ideas.

Approximately 250 Year 10 students worked in small teams forming a company each allocated a specific job role, working against the clock with a limited budget to produce a prototype calendar. Each company had the use of promotion materials and had to give a presentation pitching their product.

The Enterprise Challenge lasted a whole day and the students thoroughly enjoyed the day.

Also as part of Enterprise Week, 32 Year 12 AS Business students spent a day working in small teams to come up with a new business idea, formulate a business plan and then present it.

Brian Buckman, Management Consultant from Nododo Ltd took them through some basic principles in Business Planning, Andrew Pound, Group Marketing Director from Ricnor, ran a Sales and Marketing Session and Steve Tindell, from

businessdynamics also gave them some tips on how to prepare business presentations. Students can use their

enterprise skills in many areas of their life; at work, at home or in education. All these vital skills will help young people to make their mark.

Anti-Bullying Week was the perfect opportunity to highlight our Anti-Bullying Policy and invited those with a vested interest to be part of the review process. We began each day with a topical thought for the day and assembly so that every member of our school community could join in this celebration of children's safety.

The Anti-Bullying Focus Group and the Restorative Drama Group opened the Year 11 assemblies with theatrical performances demonstrating restorative approaches.

We also had a visit from Mark Kerr, Assistant Manager of the East Midlands Saxons American Football Club, and Marie Saleem who works for the Beatbullying Charity.

Mark spoke about how he was bullied at school and wanted to send the message "Don't suffer in silence, talking to someone will always help".

The students also raised over £150 selling Anti-Bullying wristbands.

Our aim was also to highlight some of the excellent practice we have at our school including systems of

support, raising money for the charity Childline, working within PDE lessons on the rights of a child and working with the local Police as part of our Safer Schools Partnership.

Jack Hunt students have also taken part in "Becoming BRAVE in Peterborough" and "Restorative Justice in Schools" working in partnership with the Youth Offending Team. These conferences raised issues of tackling bullying and exploring restorative approaches in Peterborough.

Jack Hunt School Visit "The Eternal City"

Fifteen Year 11 students recently went on a three day trip to Rome, accompanied by their Italian teacher Mrs Laquintana and the History teacher Mr Blant. Three days were not long enough to visit the most outstanding outdoor museum in the world: Rome, the Eternal City.

Students had pre-booked guided tours to the Vatican and the Colosseum to avoid the long queues (at the Vatican Museums there was a two mile one!) and also visited other museums and monuments which were free to visit to all European students under 18. Charming streets, amazing squares with fountains and beautiful statues, impressive roman arches and ruins, churches and elegant buildings surrounded them as they walked through the historical avenues of Rome.
