<u>Task 3:</u>

There are problems with all these tests – we will discuss these in our lessons but note down your ideas now ready to discuss them. Be critical.

<u>Task 4:</u>

Unit two will require you to carry out your own psychological investigation. There are lots of things you could do here and now is a good time to start practicing carrying out research. Have a go at researching into these two hypothesis:

- 1. Television adverts show traditional gender stereotyping
- 2. Memory ability decreases as noise increases.

For each of the above hypothesis:

- 1. Decide on how you will research this
- 2. Carry out your research please remember to keep social distancing, use your household members or remote contacts for your sample.
- 3. Write up your results what did you find? Are the hypothesis valid?
